#### The Relevance of Incarnation for the Christian Faith

"Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death— even death on a cross!"

Philippians 2:6-8 (NIV)

There is no religion other than Christianity; not Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Islam, Taoism, Jainism, Sikhism, Zoroastrianism, or the Bahá'í Faith that established such a close relationship between the divine and the human. This relationship is the element that Christianity emphasizes as its central idea, message and exclusive identity that can be ultimately expressed as the God who became human to make possible a one-on-one relationship with us because of his great love.

Behind Philippians 2:6-8 there are, at least, two dominant ideas that concern us today. The first one is the Greek expression,  $(\mathring{\alpha}\lambda\lambda\mathring{\alpha}\ \acute{\epsilon}\alpha\upsilon\tau\grave{o}\upsilon)\ \acute{\epsilon}\kappa\acute{\epsilon}\nu\omega\sigma\epsilon\upsilon)$  ekenōsen heauton, which NIV translates as "made himself nothing," but rather a better translation is "but he emptied himself." The verb form kenóō from the word kenosis is used in other texts in the New Testament (Romans 4:14, 1 Corinthians 1:17, 9:15, 2 Corinthians 9:3); in today's reading, it does have significant implications for our faith. For example, it helps us to have a glimpse of the God we serve, who has been all-powerful and decided to leave everything because of the love he has for us. And this love is free for us, even though we do not deserve it. Therefore, God empties himself because of you and me. The fact that God became human is called the Incarnation; he became flesh. Again, no other religion today has this kind of divine action / relationship.

The second point is the expression of God being obedient. Has God been obedient to whom? To his mission, to the task to give himself so you and I can be saved just by grace! Obedient to love! In fact, the proper translation is  $(\dot{\upsilon}\pi\dot{\eta}\kappa\omega)$   $(\dot{\upsilon}\pi\dot{\eta}\kappa\omega)$   $(\dot{\upsilon}\pi\dot{\eta}\kappa\omega)$  "obedient 'unto' death." This phrase may have the purpose of serving as an example to follow. After all, being obedient unto death for the Christian mission of salvation for others is the mission that Jesus left for everyone who called themselves Christians (Matthew 28: 19-20). May the Lord help us to fulfill his love and mission, unto death!

#### What is the difference between the Roman Catholic Bible and the Protestant Bible?

While the Roman Catholic Bible is the same regarding the New Testament (27 books), the Old Testament is different. For Protestants, the Old Testament contains 39 books while the Roman Catholic's Old Testament version contains 46.

For Protestants, the Old Testament has the same number of books as the Masoretic Text - which is the authoritative version in Hebrew. In other words, our Old Testament is a match of the Tanakh, the Hebrew Bible.

In 1546 at the Council of Trent the Roman Catholic Church decided to keep in their Old Testament seven books: Maccabees 1 and 2, Baruch, Letter of Jeremiah, Tobit, Judith, The Wisdom of Salomon, and the Sirach - Ecclesiasticus and make some minor additions: Books of Esther and Daniel in contrast to the Masoretic text. This version with the additions already mentioned was in circulation in Greek since the III century before Christ. These additional books are called the Apocrypha and are not in the Hebrew authoritarian Bible.

The Old Testament used by Protestants (The Hebrew Bible) is composed by three major sections - The Torah (The Law), The Nevi'im (Prophets) and the Ketuvim (The Writings). In the meantime, the Roman Catholic Old Testament version (Septuagint) has four parts: Law, History, Poetry, and the Prophets.

Yet even the Septuagint was rejected by the Jewish authorities from the beginning, the Roman Catholic Church continues using it, in part because they have made the difference between doctrine (Masoretic Text) vs. piety (the Apocrypha).

Regarding this, the Bible is clear, "Everything that I command you, you shall be careful to do. You shall not add to it or take from it." Deuteronomy 12:32

#### Jana Clarke's Devotional Reflection

Even though we speak like this, dear friends, we are convinced of better things in your case — the things that have to do with salvation. Hebrews 6:9 (NIV)

For the past few years, our church, Immanuel Lutheran Church, has been going through a "Capital Campaign" to generate sources of revenue for our growth and prosperity. It is a high bar to reach and has shaken up the cozy culture we have embraced over the years. We want to be more effective and influential in God's kingdom in our community. We want to reach out to more people and families in our neighborhood. We want to update our facilities and offer our members, worshipers, and visitors an attractive building and welcoming experience. These are the better things that the writer of Hebrews expresses in his letter – the better things that accompany salvation.

These changes are not easily accomplished. We all have grown used to our church and treat it like a comfortable spiritual sofa. We tend not to see the building's wear and tear. We tend to put up with an old computer system, organ, etc. We tend to ignore the state of our classrooms because we only use them once a week. So, what if the state of the building reflects the neglect of our spirit? Don't we tend to put up with things spiritually and rely on God to understand?

The more I get involved with this campaign and this council, the more I understand that it is not about money. It is about who we are as Christians and how we practice our faith. It is both a cultural revolution and a spiritual rebirth, which makes us honestly review our commitment to God and how we seek to serve Him. The better things that accompany salvation mean that the old way of thinking, such as "that will do" will not do, and the phrase "that is enough" just is not enough.

This campaign will change our church for the better. It has already transformed me. The prayer is that the whole congregation will embrace those changes too.

PRAYER: Lord, I ask that you keep us alive and in tune with Your Spirit moving among us. Remind us that we belong to You and our purpose is faithfully serving God's kingdom. Help us work for the better things that accompany salvation so that we may attract and welcome others to Your Church. We pray in the Name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen.

The 2023 Spend Plan of \$220,348.50 was approved at the semi-annual congregation meeting in January. This plan includes predicted expenditures for items such as worship supplies, congregational life activities, benevolences, utilities, insurance, office administration, salaries and benefits. It does not include dedicated account expenses. Operating expenses for the 1<sup>st</sup> Qtr. of 2023 were \$49,534.15.
